THE TILLAMOOK COAST PLEDGE



While visiting our coast, we ask you to consider taking our pledge of Caring for Our Coast. Download it, keep it in your backpack, and feel free to remind others to take the Pledge along with you.

1. I promise to be respectful of people and safety when enjoying the Tillamook Coast's forests, farmlands and beaches.
2. I will make my own memories, but not my own trails.
3. I will be responsible with fire on the beaches, in campgrounds, and any other designated fire areas.
4. I will heed cautionary signage. If it says "Do not go past this point!" – I won't. Double pinkie promise on this one.
5. I will enjoy the slower pace of beach life. Drive carefully.
6. If I cannot find a parking spot, I will not invent my own. Same goes for restrooms.
7. When playing at the beach, I will be mindful of sneaker waves and logs. I will NEVER turn my back on the ocean. Ever.
8. I will PACK IN reusable containers and PACK OUT all of my trash.
9. I will respect wildlife by managing my own pet(s), and not disturbing any native plants or animals.
10. I will use my turn signal often, my car horn seldom, and my middle finger never.
11. I pledge to always care for our coast.

Beach Wheelchairs

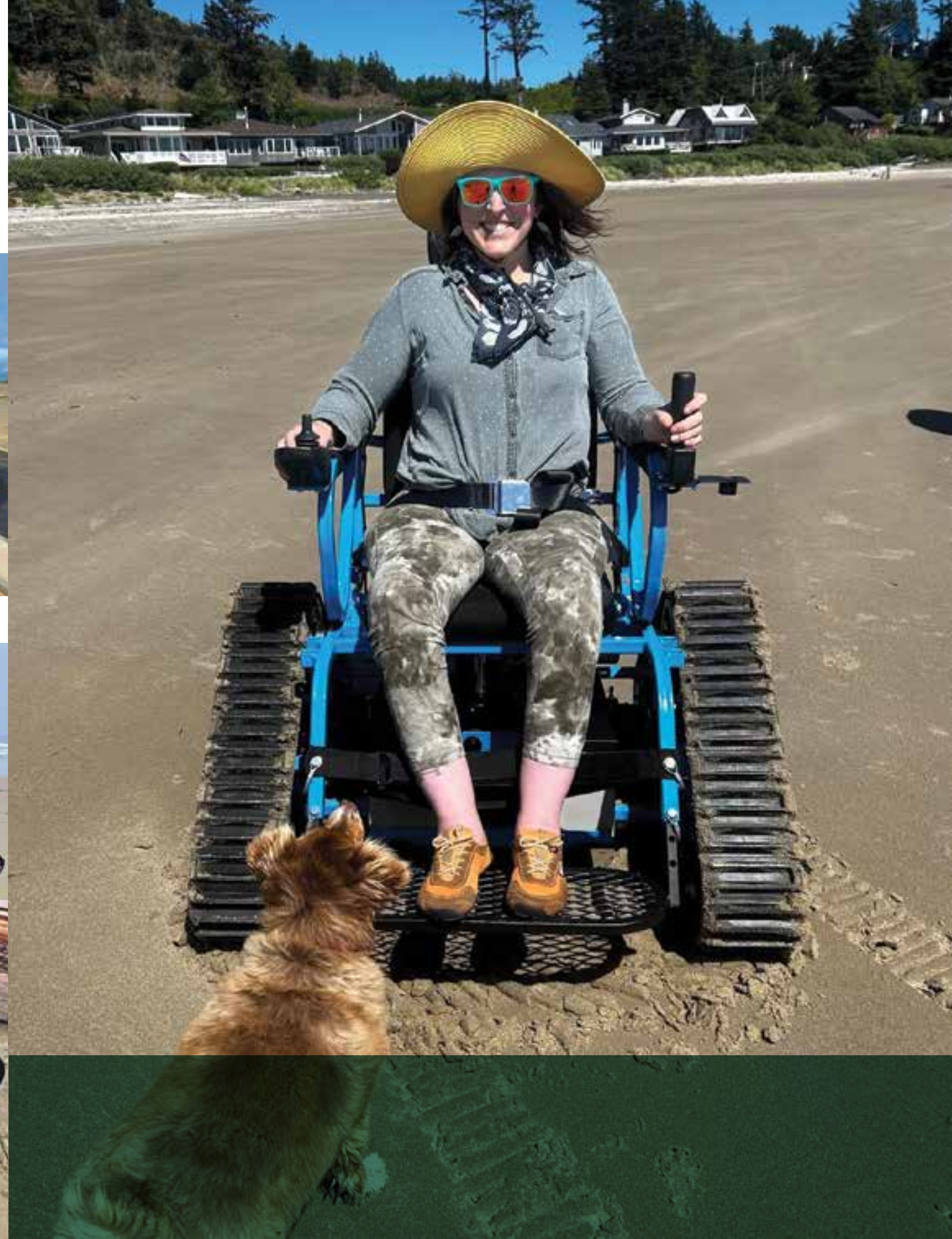
Manzanita, Nehalem Bay State Park, Rockaway Beach, Garibaldi, Barview Jetty County Park, Happy Camp at Netarts Bay, Cape Lookout State Park and Pacific City

The beach should be accessible to everyone — and on the Tillamook Coast, it is! Borrow a fat-tire wheelchair at no cost at seven locations throughout the county. The chairs easily roll through sand, making a beach day fun for all. An electric all-terrain track chair is also available from the Manzanita Visitor Center and Happy Camp Lodge. Kayak Launchers

Wheeler, Garibaldi and Tillamook

The public boat dock in Wheeler, the Port of Garibaldi marina, and Sue H. Elmore Park in Tillamook each offer kayak launchers that make setting out for a paddle easy for anyone! Simply slide your kayak in and use the handrails to push off into the water. Docking is just as easy when you pull into the launcher and use your paddle in the launcher notches to pull yourself forward.



ADA-FRIENDLY FISHING + CRABBING

Port of Garibaldi

Garibaldi

Cast a line or set a crabbing pot from the wheelchair friendly dock at the Port of Garibaldi, located between the Tillamook Estuaries Partnership and Ocean Charters buildings.

Lake Lytle

Rockaway Beach

Stocked with rainbow trout from March through May, this lake has an ADA-accessible dock and generally calm waters.

Brad Dawson Tidewater Access

Near Tillamook

Find ADA access, free parking and restrooms at this hidden gem off Highway 131. Head west from Tillamook; the stop is on the left, just past the Bayocean Road intersection.

PARKS

Twin Rocks Turnaround Park

Rockaway Beach

With 2 ADA parking spaces, an accessible asphalt trail and picnic tables designed for visitors with disabilities, this quiet seaside park is a great place to take a break or eat a quick lunch!

FLAT HIKES

Old Growth Cedar Trail

Rockaway Beach

Take a wooden boardwalk over a bog to see the “Big Cedar” nestled in a beautiful old growth forest. This 1.2-mile out and back trail is easy and accessible for wheelchairs, walkers and strollers!

Kilchis Point Reserve

Bay City

This 200-acre nature reserve along Tillamook Bay features a 2-mile paved scenic loop that weaves through abundant native plants, interpretive signage and plenty of wildlife!

ACCESSIBLE CAMPING

Nehalem Bay State Park

Nehalem

Three campsites and 18 yurts in this park are accessible to campers with disabilities. The site also has accessible restrooms.

Cape Lookout State Park

South of Netarts

This park offers variety for campers with disabilities. Pick from 2 campsites, 1 cabin, 2 yurts – all of which are accessible.

Get a behind-the-scenes tour of the commercial docks and where to buy seafood directly – be it “off the boat” or at one of the independent local seafood markets. You’ll gain a better understanding about why purchasing locally caught seafood is an important step in supporting the local economy and learn best buying tips about what to look for and what questions to ask, thus ensuring that a trip to the Port of Garibaldi for seafood is worth the effort – no matter what time of year.

The Fish Peddler

Bay City

The Fish Peddler boasts a big seafood market with a great selection of local products – and some of the freshest seafood and shellfish on the Oregon coast. The market offers outdoor dining and online ordering, as well as a variety of gourmet foods, beer, wine, clothing, canned goods and more!

The Spot

Garibaldi

The Spot is a small shop with a big personality. The “charter office turned seafood store” carries on a family tradition of fishing for owner Kelly Barnett, who stocks the store with his daily catches of salmon, lingcod, rockfish, halibut and more from his commercial vessels, the *Good Intentions* and the *Silver Girl*.

JAndy Oyster Co.

Tillamook

JAndy’s Tillamook storefront is as small and cozy as the three-member family that owns the oyster growing operation, which grows millions of oysters in Netarts Bay at any given time. Each oyster is raised with care in a pristine estuary, making them some of the tastiest in the world. Retail pick up or dine in at the oyster bar.

Nevør Shellfish Farm

Near Netarts

At Nevør Shellfish Farm, they do things a little differently. Their oysters grow in bags and on lines that the tide tumbles, instead of on the bottom of the bay, so the water the shellfish filter gives them a unique, briny taste. Want another distinctive taste? Try the smoked oysters, which come in a variety of delicious flavors.

West Fish Co.

Pacific City

Tucked away in Pacific City, this local Oregon Coast seafood market brings together *The Tycoon* and *Lil Skipper*, two fishing vessels captained by a hardworking doryman duo dedicated to bringing you the best of the Pacific Northwest Ocean. One of the Tillamook Coast’s newest seafood stores and restaurants, West Fish Co. features seasonal gems like Dungeness crabs, sea bass, tuna, lingcod and salmon – most of which is caught just miles from the store’s location!

HEALING POWERS OF THE OREGON COAST

There were many things that helped me survive the months that immediately followed the tragic loss of my partner and our home in rural Washington. Nature, writing, and perhaps most notably, the love and support of family and friends. One very remarkable act of support came from Katie, the owner of the Old Wheeler Hotel, who provided me with the keys to Room 5 of the hotel, to come and go as I pleased until I could secure more permanent lodging. It immediately became my new home.

There are some obvious reasons for the room’s appeal and ability to offer healing and peace. Not the least of which is the view. The second-floor corner space looks out over what I lovingly refer to as the Nehalem Serengeti. A landscape comprised of the Nehalem River and Bay, Lazarus Island, the Sitka Wetlands, and off in the distance, Neahkahnie Mountain and her adjoining peaks. It is a view that provides instant comfort when I wake, and limitless avenues of thought, contemplation, and inspiration throughout the day and into the evening. My coffee cruises to the public dock after sunrise followed by my wine wanders at sundown, have proven to be the finest regular bookends to a day I’ve experienced yet.

I always turn to Mother Nature when things go pear-shaped, and this time has been no different. I know better than to seek answers from her, though. Rather, I am out there hunting for perspectives. And this miraculous piece of coast has delivered them with aplomb. Among the many things that my time spent grieving and healing here has taught me, is that not all of her cycles are equal or by human empathetic assessment, remotely fair. Some, like the changing of the seasons, are more reliable with regard to timing end execution. But others can be ambiguous and dependent upon any number of variables both known and unknown.

For an ancient forest all but erased by wildfire, it can take centuries to grow back to a similar state. And depending on how that conglomeration of factors plays out, it’s likely that the forest will never resemble its former incarnation. In the interim, different, shorter, more readily observable cycles will be at work. That forest will again hold life and there will be beauty in the regrowth, just in different, yet-to-be-seen ways. Whatever the eventual outcome, it will most assuredly take time. It’s a process that neither you nor I will see completed, and in some ways, it’s a loop not meant to be closed. I’ve learned to be okay with that.



So I go out and appreciate the things currently happening and anticipate what I know is coming. The countless new greens of spring joining again in concert with the evergreens. The multicolored wildflowers of a coastal forest in June. Bird calls both foreign and familiar. The calving elk followed by the running salmon of fall. Mother Nature seems to regularly take my breath away with the intention of filling lungs deeper. I am also grateful for wheels in motion that I’m not yet aware of and cycles unseen. Trusting that with every step, paddle, breath, day, year, and indeterminate measure of whatever, I am alive and moving forward along with all of it. However slow it may seem.

Beyond the perspectives, I have found great inspiration here as well. The Oregon coast is regularly battered by wind, rain, and surf. It absorbs some of the most brutal onslaughts that the elements have to offer with reliable, historic consistency. And as long as there have been human memories to detail such things, it has exuded resilience and an uncommon beauty in the face of it all. This place is home to some of the most wondrous and life-affirming landscapes I’ve ever laid eyes on. Perhaps not despite what it goes through, but because of it.



I would wind up calling the small town of Wheeler home for 8 months before finally moving into a more permanent residence. Still on the coast, about a half-hour down the road near the town of Tillamook. At this juncture in my life, it feels somewhere between compelling and critical to be near the elk and the salmon. Where the rivers, mountains, and ocean converge. Where my favorite trees of fragrant needles and flat leaves connect the sand to the soil. Here there is life and abundance that is impossible not to be touched or influenced by. I find beauty, inspiration, meaning, perspective, and purpose every day here. This is where my journey continues. Make it through another day, collect another sunset.

BEACH SAFETY

Sneaker waves and riptides make up the majority of rescue attempts, so it is important to be informed about the signs and characteristics of these hazards.

Explore landmarks big and small. While the sandy city beaches are popular with visitors, there is more diversity here than meets the eye. Along with the sunny days that bring surfing, tanning and outdoor activities like fishing, the beach also provides great opportunities for bird-watching on marshy estuaries, tidepooling on rocky shores or visiting lighthouses on coastal headlands.

STAY SAFE

Any time you're planning a trip to the shore—but perhaps especially when you're going to remote or “hidden” spots—pay attention to the weather forecast, sunset time and the tide schedule to stay safe. And as much as you may want to keep secret spots, you know, secret, always tell someone where you're going!



Rockaway Beach

Snuggled within a landscape of spruce and pines, this pretty oceanside city boasts a stretch of seven miles of pristine white sand beachfront. The Manzanita weather is perfect, so you can spend a day at the beach with the sun, while other areas of the Oregon coast are covered in clouds.

Nehalem Bay State Park

Near Nehalem

Two day-use areas at this picturesque state park offer access to large curving beaches and bayfront. Boat rentals and guided tours are also available, so you can set out to sea for yourself (or with a guide)!

Rockaway Beach

Rockaway Beach

With seven miles of sandy beach and more than 100 vacation rental houses and 200 hotel rooms to choose from, there is no lack of things to do and places to stay in family-friendly Rockaway Beach. Enjoy beachcombing, metal detecting, kite flying (there is an annual kite festival in August), shopping or walking in the peaceful sunset.



Oceanside Beach

Barview Jetty County Park & Campground

Near Garibaldi

One of the Tillamook Coast's best kept secrets, this park and campground offers a brief, two-minute walk to an amazing beachfront. Though the beach is only half a mile long, it is very broad, which creates a welcoming sandy shoreline. It's a popular site for surfing, hiking, scuba diving and, of course, fishing!

Cape Meares Beach

Cape Meares

Cape Meares is a sleepy village by the ocean, tucked between a lake and large bluff of the same name. Set out across the beach for Bayocean Spit, the location of an old ghost town with miles more of coastline.

Netarts Bay

Netarts

Happy Camp at Netarts Bay is the portal to a beach where at low tide, you can walk all the way to Oceanside. Netarts Bay is the cleanest bay on the west coast.

Oceanside Beach

Oceanside

Oceanside is built upon a steep hillside that overlooks the beachfront and offers stunning views of the Pacific Ocean. As you walk along the beach, you will discover a tunnel through one of the vertical sea cliffs leading to yet another beautiful beach to explore. Just up the road is the iconic Cape Meares Lighthouse.

Pacific City

Pacific City not only has a great beach and dune, it's home to the historic Dory Fleet.

Cape Lookout State Park

South of Netarts

Explore miles of ocean beaches along the Netarts Spit at Cape Lookout State Park. Here, magnificent views can be enjoyed with easy access to the beach. Beachcombing, whale watching, birding and hiking are among the most popular activities for park-goers. And the park is purportedly a good place to find elusive glass floats hidden along trails and beach access points.

Sitka Sedge State Park

Near Sandlake

Sitka Sedge is Oregon’s newest state park. You’ll see tidal flats, saltwater marshes, forested wetlands, abundant marsh wildlife and beach views stretching for miles. Visitors can hike the 3.5 miles of looping trails, including the 1/2-mile-long Beltz Dike Trail that leads from the parking area west through Sand Lake Estuary and coniferous forested dunes to the beach.

Tierra Del Mar

25 miles south of Tillamook

Coming from the north, head down the Three Capes Scenic Route through a winding stretch of thick forest canopies and a variety of homesteads and ranches, with glimpses of the bay through the trees. As the road begins to straighten out and the trees disappear, you are presented with a captivating view of the Pacific Ocean and Tierra Del Mar. This two-mile stretch of pristine beach features dramatic views of Cape Kiwanda to the south and Cape Lookout to the north.



Neskowin Beach

Bob Straub State Park

Pacific City

Take a scenic saunter on the peaceful and wildlife laden Bob Straub State Park. Named after the former state treasurer who helped preserve the pristine Nestucca Spit by advocating that Highway 101 veer inland, this sandy oasis is Pacific City’s pride and joy. Find trails for hiking and horses, picnic tables and ADA restrooms. The 484-acre beach park is open year-round and is free for public day use.

Neskowin Beach

Neskowin

This wide, three-mile beach is rarely crowded allowing visitors to rejuvenate. Launch your canoe or kayak through the pristine bird estuary of Nestucca Bay. The beach also features the Neskowin Ghost Forest.. Only visible when the tide rolls out, a “forest” of 2000-year-old tree trunks pepper the shoreline for a truly unique view.

STEWARDS OF LAND AND SEA

Pier’s End Boathouse

Garibaldi

It is worth a visit not only because it offers a unique vantage point for viewing Tillamook Bay, but because the decommissioned U.S. Coast Guard lifeboat station represents the region’s maritime history. It is one of the few of its kind built over the water and using a marine railway to launch motor lifeboats. Pier’s End Boathouse was constructed in the mid-1930s to house two 36-foot motor lifeboats and a 26-foot, oar-powered surfboat. All three vessels were launched on rails, fully manned and ready to search for seafarers in distress, through large doors. Coast Guard personnel winched the boats back into the building when they returned.

Cape Meares Lighthouse

Near Oceanside

Cape Meares Lighthouse may be the shortest on the Oregon coast, but it features an impressive, kerosene-powered lens. First lit on Jan. 1, 1890, the first order Fresnel lens was one of the most powerful and largest of its day. Mariners could spot the distinctive red-and-white flashes from more than 21 miles away. A paved 0.2-mile path leads from the main parking area to the lighthouse, passing many viewpoints and interpretive panels along the way. The inside of the lighthouse and a gift shop are open May to September. The tower is open by tour only. Admission is free, and no reservations are needed. For everyone’s safety, no backpacks and no carrying children.

Tillamook Forest Center

22 miles east of Tillamook

The Tillamook Forest Center is a shining jewel on the Tillamook Coast. An engaging interpretive center tells the story of the historic Tillamook Burn and reforestation. Don’t miss the powerful film, *Legacy of Fire*, shown in the center’s surroundsound theater. tillamookforestcenter.org

BOOK ONLINE

HIKING

The Tillamook Coast offers numerous opportunities for hiking in Oregon on coastal trails. Most of these hiking destinations are too beautiful for words. With a wide range of distances suited for a variety of experience levels, there is a trail for everyone. From the novice to the experienced, the Tillamook coast has the perfect trail for you.

TRAIL TIPS, ETIQUETTE AND STEWARDSHIP



The Tillamook Coast is home to a multitude of hiking trails, all of which are included in an online GIS map at tillamookcoast.com/recreation-map. Outdoor writer Adam Sawyer has a list of tips for making it a terrific experience, for you, your dog and other hikers.

Preparation and Safety

1. Navigation: It's a good idea to carry a map and a compass. These can be augmented with things like altimeters and GPS units, but always have a map of the area and a compass.

2. Sun protection: Bring sunglasses, sunscreen, and proper clothing, including a hat.

3. Insulation: Will there be a blizzard on Kings Mountain in August? Probably not. However, you should have whatever it takes to survive the worst conditions that can be reasonably expected. Wear clothing that is not made of cotton and that can wick moisture away from the body. Dress in layers, especially in cooler weather. Pack extra socks. If things are going to be cold or wet, bring waterproof rain gear.

4. Illumination: Flashlights, headlamps, and LEDs all work. Bring spare batteries.

5. First-aid supplies: At the very least you will need some gauze, bandages, tape, and pain meds. There are many prepackaged kits available that include everything from bare-bones basics to an outdoor aid station.

6. Fire: This includes waterproof matches, disposable lighters, and chemical heat tabs.

7. Repair kit and tools: A knife or multitool is fairly standard. Depending on what you're doing, duct tape and rope can be handy as well.

8. Nutrition: At least enough food for an extra day and night in the wilderness. Nutrition bars, jerky, nuts, and the like all work.

9. Hydration: Always have at least a water bottle or water bladder/reservoir system. You should also have some sort of water treatment or filtration on hand.

10. Emergency shelter: Consider keeping a space blanket in your pack. Rain gear or even a trash bag will do in a pinch.



Stewardship

1. Good campsites are found, not made.

2. Stick to the trails, don't make new ones.

3. Dispose of waste properly: *if you pack it in, pack it out.*

4. Examine, photograph, but *do not touch cultural or historic structures and artifacts.*

5. Use toilet facilities. However, if need arises and there are no facilities, deposit solid waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails.

6. Observe wildlife from a distance. Do not follow or approach them. Never feed animals.

7. Campfire safety: Where fires are permitted, use established fire rings. Keep fires small. Burn all wood and coals to ash, put out campfires completely, then scatter cool ashes. On the beach, douse with water – don't just cover with sand. In summer, campfires are often banned to avoid brush and forest fires.

8. If hiking with your dog, please always adhere to the leash regulations of the trail or recreation area you are visiting. They vary, so please check before you go. Owners are required to carry a leash.

9. Make sure your dog has a *collar with ID, or is microchipped.*

10. Bring water for your dog – saltwater can make them sick.



CAPE & SPITS

Cape Meares

Near Oceanside

Take the short jaunt to the lighthouse or Octopus Tree (at the end of the Cape Meares Loop), or lace up your boots and hike the 885-foot trail down to the beach, passing by the 144-foot tall Big Spruce that’s 4-feet in diameter.

Netarts Spit

Netarts

Colloquially known as Sand Dollar Spit, this 10-mile out-and-back hike along a narrow sand bar is best done at low tide. The trail leaves from the Cape Lookout State Park day use area near the park’s campground. Keep an eye out for sand dollars – the beach in this area is laden with them!

Cape Lookout

Eight miles south of Netarts

The 5-plus mile round-trip trail offers one of the best whale-watching perches on the Oregon Coast. The trail starts out flat, then drops slightly toward the tip of the cape, with steep cliffs. On a clear day, you can see south 39 miles to Cape Foulweather and north 42 miles to Tillamook Head.

Bayocean Spit

Near Cape Meares

With the bay on one side and an expansive beach on the other – connected by sandy trails lined with salal and sword fern – Bayocean Spit is a hiking and birding hotspot, and home to beaver and deer.

Cape Kiwanda

Near Pacific City

The hike up the sandy, 230-foot dune of Cape Kiwanda is relatively easy, and it rewards with views of dory launches and crashing waves aloft with surfers. Coming down is easy too – just slide on your butt.

Nestucca Spit

Near Pacific City

Start at the Bob Straub State Park Trailhead in Pacific City and walk across the dunes towards the ocean. At spit’s end, harbor seals and fishermen vie for the Nestucca River’s legendary salmon and steelhead.

Nehalem Spit

Near Nehalem

This flat, 4-mile, out-and-back trail has ocean on one side, bay on the other. It is a Western Snowy Plover Management Area, so walk on wet sand only between March 15th and September 15th.

VISTAS & WATERFALLS

Neahkahnie Mountain

Near Manzanita

This thigh-thumping hike starts at Oswald West State Park (look for hiker-symbol between milepost 41-42 on Highway 101), but rewards you with a breathtaking view of the stretch of beach below, near Manzanita.

Munson Creek Falls

Seven miles south of Tillamook

Perhaps Tillamook's shortest hike, at just one-quarter mile, takes you to its tallest waterfall, at 319 feet. Go in the rainy season when the falls are gushing and ferns are dripping with dew.

Kings Mountain

Twenty-five miles east of Tillamook

Five miles of rugged trail with a 2,500-foot gain in elevation, this hike starts at a trail head off the Wilson River Highway (Highway 6, milepost 25). From the summit, take in the awe of the Lester Creek Valley.

University Falls

Thirty-five miles east of Tillamook

Take this easy, half-mile hike to a picture-worthy waterfall the plunges 55 feet over a basalt cliff and is framed by red alder trees.

Mt. Hebo

Five miles east of Hebo

The tallest peak in the Coast Range, a hike up this mountain starts at Hebo Lake Campground near Indian Trail. Pass through two forest meadows before reaching the peak and a glimpse of the ocean.

NATURE & WILDLIFE

One of the best kept secrets of the Tillamook Coast is the number of nature and wildlife reserves to explore. From Manzanita to Neskowin, and all places in between, there are many protected areas to hike, stroll, watch birds, spot wildlife and learn about natural history.

Near Pacific City

Oregon has 22 major estuaries, but only five are so untouched that they are classified as “natural.” North of Pacific City, the 897-acre Sand Lake Estuary is the largest of these.

Sitka Sedge State Natural Area

Near Pacific City

Oregon’s newest park, Sitka Sedge State National Area showcases one of the state’s last intact estuaries. The area’s natural beauty shines bright, thanks to the intentional lack of development that protects the pastures, sand dunes and bird habitat. The main trail leads you through the undisturbed landscape and by blooming foxglove, salal and wild rose flowers gorgeous enough to leave you spellbound.

Nestucca Bay National Wildlife Refuge

Near Neskowin

Welcome to Nestucca Bay National Wildlife Refuge. It offers more than 1,200 acres of refuge south of Pacific City and winter habitat for varieties of geese, including the rare Semidi Islands goose. Black-tailed deer and harbor seals also call this place home.

FIND YOUR BEST NATURE SPOT

Kilchis Point Reserve

Near Bay City

This interpretive trail weaves wildlife, pioneer history and Native American history into one beautiful reserve. The trails – all ADA friendly – lead to a birdwatching station and a view of Tillamook Bay untouched by civilization.

Cape Meares National Wildlife Refuge

Near Oceanside

Just north of Oceanside (at the end of the Cape Meares Loop), lush with moss-draped trees, this refuge is a green haven for those wanting to recharge their spirits and view wildlife, too. The refuge is near Cape Meares Lighthouse, which offers its own brand of viewing and history.

Three Arch Rocks National Wildlife Refuge

Oceanside

This untamed marine environment in Oceanside features big colonies of seabirds that hang out on offshore rocks. Peregrine falcons, common murre and other seabirds nest as whales and sea lions frolic in the waters below.

Whalen Island

Near Pacific City

Clay Myers State Natural Area on Whalen Island just north of Pacific City offers a pristine 1.4-mile loop hike that overlooks a rich tidal wetland before passing through mixed woodlands, offering views of the estuary joining the ocean.

WHALE WATCHING

Contrary to popular belief, whale watching can be a year-round activity, with gray whales the most commonly seen. Almost any location with an ocean view may offer whale sightings. You will have a better chance of spotting a whale in the morning. First scan the ocean for spouting and then zoom in more closely with binoculars.

To get an even closer view, consider whale watching with Garibaldi Charters. Their boats will find and follow the gentle giants. garibaldicharters.com



SEASONAL VIEWING

Elk Everywhere!

Keep Your Eyes Open

Maybe it's the unpredictability of when they might appear, or maybe it's their inherent majesty in the naturally beautiful landscape. Whatever the reason, nothing quite compares to spotting one of our resident elk herds. Remember: Look but don't touch. We love our elk, but approaching these animals is very dangerous.



King Tides

Entire Coastline

Extremely high "King Tides" occur a few times throughout the year, when a new or full moon is closest to the Earth. This natural phenomenon provides a mesmerizing show of the power of the ocean. But be warned: King Tides create extremely hazardous beach conditions, even for experienced beach-goers. Some tidal surges breach well beyond the beach, and unexpected "sneaker" waves can knock a person off their feet and sweep them into the ocean. So please watch from a safe distance and never turn your back on the water!



MARINE RESERVES

The Tillamook Coast is lucky enough to have two marine reserves. Marine reserves are dedicated to conservation and scientific research, so please leave all sea life behind for others to enjoy.

Cape Falcon

Near Manzanita

Cape Falcon has sand that provides the ideal home for crabs and other animals that like soft bottom habitats. Along the shore, you'll find rocky intertidal habitats to the north and south of Short Sand Beach, where you can spot mussels and sea anemones attached to the rocks.

Cascade Head

Near Neskowin

Travel south to Neskowin, and you'll enjoy the beginning of Cascade Head Marine Reserve. Underwater here, the reserve includes the north segment of the Siletz Reef. This is an extensive rocky reef home to many species of groundfish, such as canary rockfish; invertebrates, such as giant plumose anemones; and seaweeds.

TRADITIONAL PUTTS

Manzanita Links

Play 9 holes at Manzanita Golf Course. This is a popular recreational place for visitors and locals alike. The course can be played year-round as it is built on sand, so rain doesn't pool. With a golf pro in-house and a driving range, there are golfing options for everyone.

Troxel's Rock Garden Mini Golf

Rockaway Beach

Kids and adults can enjoy the Wizard of Oz-themed nine-hole mini golf course at \$3 per game. It's also an actual rock garden, made with rocks and minerals from around the world.

Alderbrook Golf Course

Tillamook

The only 18-hole golf course in Tillamook County, "The Mook" is a local favorite and open year-round. The Bunker Grille serves meals 6 days a week, breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Neskowin Golf Course

Sometimes called the "jewel of the Oregon Coast," Neskowin Beach Golf Course offers family-friendly golf at a location you're sure to love. (The view from the seventh tee is especially spectacular!) After golfing the 9-hole course, stop into the charming clubhouse for coffee and a chat with the locals!

DISC GOLF

Bohannon Disc Golf Course

Tillamook

It began as an idea for a fun PE class, and it turned into an 18-hole course for the whole community. Located on the fields around Tillamook Junior High School and East Elementary, the course is closed to the public during school hours.

Blimp Base Disc Golf Course

Tillamook -- opening fall 2024

Crafted by nationally renowned designers, Blimp Base is the newest addition to Tillamook's disc golf options. The course winds through trees and hills to offer a bit more challenge than Bohannon. Stop into the nearby Tillamook Air Museum to find equipment for sale!

THE FISH PEDDLER

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FISHING, CLAMMING & CRABBING

Tillamook Bay is the largest coastal bay on Oregon's north coast—and the second largest in the state! Salmon, steelhead, tuna and lingcod are the top four species in our waters—but there's lots more to catch. Go out on your own or with a guide. A charter boat can show you a thing or two and get you out on the water for deep sea fishing to catch halibut, tuna, lingcod, rock fish and sea trout.

HELP KEEP OUR WATERS PRISTINE

Visitors are drawn to the Tillamook Coast for the miles and miles of waterline. And local residents and visitors work very hard to keep them pristine. Tillamook Estuaries Partnership (TEP) is a part of 28 National Estuary Projects that works to protect and restore the health of estuaries. TEP produces four water trail guides packed with information about the local watersheds — and how you can help care for them.

DORY BOAT FISHING

Almost as iconic as Haystack Rock, dory boats have become a symbol of Cape Kiwanda. Traditional dories have been used for hundreds of years, not just in the Northwest but across North America. They were designed to carry thousands of pounds of wet fish and have been known, historically, for their sturdy design— allowing them to carry a heavy load for their relatively modest size, without capsizing.

However, they serve as more than just an icon for this beautiful area; they also provide a unique fishing opportunity. There are a variety of dory boat chartered trips available in Pacific City including bottom fish, salmon, halibut and Dungeness crab. Adventurers also will get to experience the thrill of a dory boat beach launch and landing!

FISHING

Fishing on Oregon’s Tillamook Coast is a year-round activity. CLAMMING & CRABBING

There are five rivers that flow into Tillamook Bay, producing some of the best bay fishing, clam digging and crabbing west of the Mississippi. Nehalem Bay, Tillamook Bay and Netarts Bay all have local marinas where boats and equipment can be rented and bait purchased.

Jetty Fishery offers a guided experience. You can harvest crabs directly from the docks at the marinas. You can also secure the necessary supplies for Nestucca Bay in nearby Pacific City. Several other marinas in Tillamook County include Garibaldi Marina, Kelly's Brighton Marina, Netarts Bay Marina and Wheeler Marina, which are also great Oregon Coast crabbing spots. Didn't get your Dungeness crab today? That's okay! Head back to Kelly's Brighton Marina and watch as the staff pulls a Dungeness crab from the live well, cooks and cleans it. Then you get to eat it!

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
