## Welcome to the Tillamook **County Quilt Trail!**

Quilts have been part of Tillamook County since the early pioneers first came over the mountains to the Oregon coast. As the first of its kind on the west coast, the Tillamook County Quilt Trail attracts visitors from across the country. Now you, too, can join the trail to explore and celebrate art and history through the colorful quilt blocks mounted on barns and businesses throughout our county.

## Bringing the Quilt Trail West

The quilt trail concept originated in Ohio, becoming a popular attraction with approximately 3,000 quilt blocks on display across the eastern United States. In August of 2009, multiple Tillamook organizations came together to establish the first quilt trail west of the Rockies. The Tillamook Quilt Trail began with just thirteen 8x8-foot wooden blocks crafted by local quilters and artisans and has since expanded to 85 locations, with over 100,000 brochures published.

### Look for the Blocks

The Quilt Trail is split into three routes. The "Original Pioneer Quilts" and "Around the County" quilts can be viewed by car on a comfortable drive around the Tillamook area. Or, if you'd prefer a leisurely stroll, head to the city of Tillamook and use the enclosed map to look for the "Downtown Walking Quilts" — 34 quilt blocks mounted on buildings owned by citizens and businesses throughout town.

Across the three routes, there are 80 quilt blocks to be discovered... see if you can find them all!

**Original Pioneer Quilts** 



Alteher/Gienger Farm Quilt Block: Card Trick 2325 Latimer Rd N, Tillamook, OR

This farm was originally built by John Alteher, a young Swiss farmer. After the girl who stole his heart rebuffed his proposal, once-social John became a hermit. One of the few dairy holdouts, he refused to sell his milk to the Tillamook County Creamery (which now owns the property), even though it was right across the street.



The Leuthold Farm

Quilt Block: Lewis & Clark 2425 McCormick Loop, Tillamook, OR

Five generations of the Leuthold family have grown up on this farm since Adolf and Anna (Kohler) arrived at Ellis Island in New York Harbor via ship from Meiringen, Switzerland in 1911 and 1913, respectively. The quilt block hangs on the oldest barn in the building complex — the original milking barn where Adolf milked 13 cows.



## The Leuthold Heifer Barn

Quilt Block: Oregon by Jan Alan 2425 McCormick Loop, Tillamook, OR

Many Swiss immigrants settled in this valley in the early 1900s. They claimed this area reminded them of their own little valleys in the homeland. Most became dairy farmers  $\,$ because of the lush pasture land and mild climate. This part of the farm has been in the family since 1999.







The Obrist Farm was originally owned by John Kunzi, a Swiss immigrant who purchased the farm in 1914. John married in 1916, raised three children, and became the first Grade A Dairyman in Tillamook in the early 1950s.
















































































































The Mural at Latimer Quilt & Textile Center Quilt Block: Mural

In 2012, the Quilt Trail decided to broaden its scope to murals, choosing the Latimer Quilt and Textile Center for its first. Designed by Breanna Moran, it features a quilter sewing in  $front \, of \, an \, agricultural \, landscape, bordered \, by \, images \, of \,$ Tillamook's historic creameries and the trail's collaboration



with 4H and the Boy Scouts.

The Anker Farm

Quilt Block: Mt. Hood Miller Avenue, Tillamook, OR

This barn was built by the Beal family and purchased by A.J. Swett in 1939 from the Federal Land Bank. The Swetts sold it to the Tohl family 12 years later in 1951. The property, which has always been a dairy farm, is currently owned by the Anker family. The quilt block is best viewed looking East from Hwy 101 S, near Les Schwab.



Tillamook Chamber of Commerce

**Kuipers Family Farm** Quilt Block: Windblown Square, and Westward Ho 4030 Hwy 101 South, Tillamook, OR

The Kuipers Family Farm is a Tillamook County Creamery Association member dairy. The farm milks 570 Holstein and Jersey cows and is owned by Garritt and Sheryl Kuipers and their son and daughter-in-law Cory and Charlene. The large white barn has two quilt blocks: "Windblown Square" on the north end, "Westward Ho" to the south.




Jenck Farms was purchased as a 100-acre parcel by Don "Hooker" Jenck and his wife Andrea. Originally covered in trees and tussocks, Hooker worked tirelessly to turn the land into the beautiful pastures seen today. Now encompassing 220 acres Jenk Farms is run by Donnie and Joe Jenck whose operation includes milk cows and a hay hauling business.





**Tillamook County Fairgrounds** Quilt Block: Western Star 4603 3rd Street, Tillamook, OR

In 1921, a county-wide levy of \$1 million was approved to acquire and build the present fairgrounds. Over 90 acres were donated, and in 1925 the County Fair was held in the new domed exhibit building. In 1926-27, the grandstand, barns, and dance hall were added. Today approximately 63 acres remain, making up the largest events facility in the county.






























































# The Quilt Trail Goes Downtown






